COLLINS TO UNVEIL DOWNTOWN SECRETS IN AUTUMN

Collins will publish an illustrated companion book to ITV drama "Downton Abbey" in September, coinciding with the second season of the hit series. Collins publisher Hannah MacDonald and senior editor Louise Stanley bought world rights in all languages to the book from Gareth Nearne, m.d. of TV production company Carnival, and Annabel Merullo at PFD. MacDonald said: "The World of Downton Abbey will add greater depth and detail to the characters and the social history of the period, as well as bringing interviews and behind-the-scenes secrets."

'AUDACIOUS' EARTHQUAKE TALE TO BLOOMSBURY

Bloomsbury has bought a novel about a boy trapped in a collapsed building in the aftermath of the Haiti earthquake. In Darkness by Nick Lake, children's editorial director at HarperCollins, will be published in both adult and young adult editions in January 2012, simultaneously in the UK, US and Australia. The story tells of 14-year-old Shorty, trapped in an earthquake-hit hospital in Port au Prince. Bloomsbury children's publishing director Sarah Odedina and Helen Garnons-Williams, editorial director for fiction, jointly bought world English-language rights to the novel from Caradoc King at AP Watt.

BARNES WINS DAVID COHEN PRIZE

Thrice Man Booker-shortlisted author Julian Barnes has been awarded the \$40,000 David Cohen Prize for Literature 2011 for his lifetime achievements in literature. Barnes was presented with the award by chair of judges Mark Lawson at a gala ceremony at the British Library on Thursday night [17th March]. The \$12,500 Clarissa Luard Award was given to The Reading Agency to support their reading initiatives for young offenders. The biennial David Cohen Prize recognises a living writer from the UK and Ireland whose oeuvre merits recognition for a lifetime's achievement in literature.

DONOGHUE'S ROOM ON ORANGE LONGLIST

Man Booker shortlistee Emma Donoghue has been longlisted for the Orange Prize for Fiction 2011. The 20-strong list was released on Wednesday [15th March] and includes Joanna Kavenna, who won the 2008 Orange New Writers' Prize for her début novel *Inglorious*, and has been longlisted for her second, *The Birth of Love*. "It was a huge tussle to get the list down to 20, but what we have is a gorgeous, widely varied longlist," said Bettany Hughes, chair of judges.
